School Goals for 3rd-5th

Promise Academy Spring Hill administrators have analyzed our student achievement data to determine the most important areas for improvement for our school.

2024-2025 Goals:

Reading-To increase reading proficiency from 27.6% to 32.1% on the TN Ready Assessment, our school will concentrate on the following areas:

- *Phonics and letter sound development in grades K-2
- *Establishing and deepening understanding of texts in grade 3-5
- *Writing cohesive structured narratives, informational, and opinion passages in grade 3-5

Math- To increase math proficiency from 17.6% to 22.7 % on the TNReady Assessment

our school will concentrate on the following areas:

- *Place value and estimation in grades K-5
- *Increasing math fluency



C3: Community, Connections, Commitment

In the Classroom (Teachers Will...)

- Kindergarten through fifth grade teachers will send home a monthly weekly with upcoming skills.
- Students will receive daily homework from teachers in reading and math that is closely aligned to their work in the classroom for additional practice.
- Teachers will provide rigorous, purposeful, interactive and engaging lessons that will develop their conceptual understanding, as well as deepen their mathematical content through reasoning, problem-solving and critical thinking

At Home

- Create an atmosphere of reading together
- Shared reading at least 20 minutes a day: Parents read to the child and the child read to parents
- Before reading the book, have your child look at the pictures and predict or guess what the book will be about based on the pictures.
- After reading the book, have your child tell the story back to you. Ask him/her to put the story in order that it happened. Have your child identify the beginning, middle, and end of the story.
- Set time aside for students to complete homework.
- Create conversations around the text students read.

Students

Promise Academy Spring Hill students joined the staff to develop ideas about how they can succeed and soar in math and reading. Students thought of the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and school:

- Complete homework in a quiet place and turn in daily.
- Ask and answer questions to have a better understanding.
- Read more books.
- Practice math facts (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division).
